The boat yard currently has 10 homeowners on the waiting list for spaces. If you have a space and a key and no longer need the space, you are encouraged to surrender your key so that your space can be filled. If you do not return your key at the next renewal, you will be charged for the key and lock replacement (I think the price is around \$250.00).

Boating season is here and we'll be using our boats more often. To help others remove and put their boats back into their space, please back your boat as far as possible into your space. No one wants to damage their vehicles because they hit a trailer extending too far toward the driving lane.

The boatyard continues soliciting bids for the much anticipated expansion to add more space and boat parking spaces for the Sweetgrass homeowners. We believe we are getting close, or at least in the ball park of our Board recommended budget. We are looking

*All ARB submittals are to be completed online. This is located on our neighborhood's website under the homeowners tab. Click on the ARB request button and everything required to be filled out is right there. Feel free to include more information than required and pictures and



drawings are always helpful for a faster response.

*Just as the applications are now paperless, so are the approvals. If you have any questions or concerns about any work, feel free to contact me directly or A-Plus as we have records of all approved work. Any potential violations can also be reported to either of us and they will be handled in the appropriate manner according to our bi-laws and C&R's.

*Emergency repairs do not require ARB approval, but we do ask that you let us know so we can keep a record of this work should any questions arise.

Ponds Report

Top 5 Pond Questions!

Hi neighbors! If you're new to the neighborhood, first of all, welcome! The awesome ponds in this neighborhood, their appearance, and protection from flooding was an influencing factor in the purchase of our house in Sweetgrass, and maybe it was for you too. If you weren't around at the annual meeting, I'd like to share that all of our new aerators (bubblers) have been installed each and every pond. This will cut down on algae and help delay costly dredging. With that bit of news out of the way, I bring you the top 5 pond questions I receive from Sweetgrass residents, new and old.

Top 5 Pond Questions:

1) Are there fish in the ponds? Yes, tons! We have grass carp which help cut down on excessive plant growth by eating aquatic weeds, blue tilapia who feast on algae and keep the water clear, largemouth bass, bream including bluegill and others, mosquito fish, American eels, and maybe more! You may also appreciate the fowl including wood ducks, mallards, cormorants, and geese. Turtles abound as well, and there have even been otters spotted in past years. Keep an eye out and tell me what else you see.

1st Quarter

to add around 10 spaces and (hopefully) widen the yard to make parking easier while maintaining a reasonable tree buffer to dampen noise from the car wash on Hungryneck Blvd.

If/when expansion is approved, look for updates on the Sweetgrass Facebook page about moving your boat out of the yard so that it will not hinder construction crews.

2) Can I fish in the ponds? Yes! But, you must obtain permission from the property owner if you intend to fish from the bank. There are no HOA-owned or "common" areas from which to access ponds. My best suggestion is to get permission to access the water from a neighbor, and use a paddleboard, kayak, canoe, inner tube, or other vessel to fish all of the water. Once you are in the water, you may navigate any water you can float in. We do encourage catch and release, because of chemicals, which may be present in the water due to natural runoff, residential pesticide use, etc.



3) I live on a pond. Can I build a dock? Yes! As seen in the GIS map above, property lines extend into the ponds to allow for small docks,

sea walls, etc. to be built. As a reminder, all such construction requires ARB approval, which has been given to many of our neighbors in the past to build beautiful, functional docks for fishing, boating, or just enjoying the view and dipping your toes.

4.) I don't live on a pond. Why should I care about them? Good question. During periods of excessive rain brought on by hurricanes or other weather events, the ponds are essentially giant vessels for collecting all that rainwater. If we filled them all in and installed soccer fields instead, we'd all be knee deep in our homes every time it rained. So the next time your house doesn't flood, thank a pond.

5.) My pond bank is eroding; what can I do? You have a couple options. You may wish to install a wooden seawall to strongly hold back the earth of your yard from spilling into the water. These are attractive and last a long time. Another route is to purchase and plant certain vegetation at or near the waterline whose root systems will lock the soil in place. Search google for "shorescaping freshwater shorelines" for DIY plantings, or search for "wetland carpet" for a pre-made option that comes in large rolls and plants like grass sod.

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
